Dear Parents,

It is a pleasure to introduce this year's Governors Annual Report again. It has been an incredibly busy year and I wasn't available at the start of the year as I was in Australia supporting my son as he recovered from major surgery.

So I need to thank Andre Haynes, my Vice Chairman for meeting with Estyn, the school inspectorate in Wales, when they returned for their successful follow up visit in September. This outcome gave everyone a great boost to embark on yet another challenging year of school improvement.

Ready for the start of the academic year the Governing Body restructured itself by changing its Instrument of Governance to reduce our numbers in total from 18 to 14. This meant we lost 1 Community, 1 Parent, 1 Teacher and 1 Local Authority Governor which has made our size more effective this year. We look forward to welcoming two new parent governors who are being elected early this term and 1 Local Authority Governor who is being appointed.

This year has truly been 'all about learning' and not just for the children. Steve King with his Strategic Leadership Team have been unstinting with their energy, creativity, and commitment to lead and support all our staff to develop *excellence* in their teaching and learning strategies across the curriculum but especially in Numeracy and Science and for all of our children whatever their abilities this year.

This has resulted in children achieving results above what was initially expected of them. Our overall standards have dipped marginally at KS2 because this year we had a larger number of children than previously with some learning difficulties. However we are delighted that they exceeded their personal targets, which is cause for great celebration for children, their parents and of course the staff who helped them. Our younger children in Foundation Phase have achieved excellent results. Details of all their achievements are detailed within this report.

We welcomed some new staff at the beginning of the year and in July we said an emotional farewell to Year 6 and two of their teaching assistants who between them had accumulated more than 40 years service at The Dell.

The Dell has seen many changes this year to the way the learning areas are used and decorated, It is becoming ever more vibrant and exciting both inside and outside. Many of the outdoor improvements, especially the conservation area, have been enabled through the newly created and very energetic Parent Teacher Association. Our thanks go to them and for all their contributions.

Finally, I would like to conclude with a very personal reflection on where I feel The Dell is today:-

A school improvement journey is never ending. Since it opened in 1989 the journey has had its many ups and its downs but has never been easy! For the last 3 years we have been privileged to be working with a Headteacher who has an abundance of passion, inspiration, energy, aspirations and a vision for the future of your children's education. He has infected the staff and children alike to ensure the atmosphere and learning environment is lively, vibrant, colourful, positive, fun and successful for everyone.

I hope you and your children enjoy and value the learning journey we are all travelling, working together to create an 'excellent' school. I thank everyone connected with the school for their contribution.

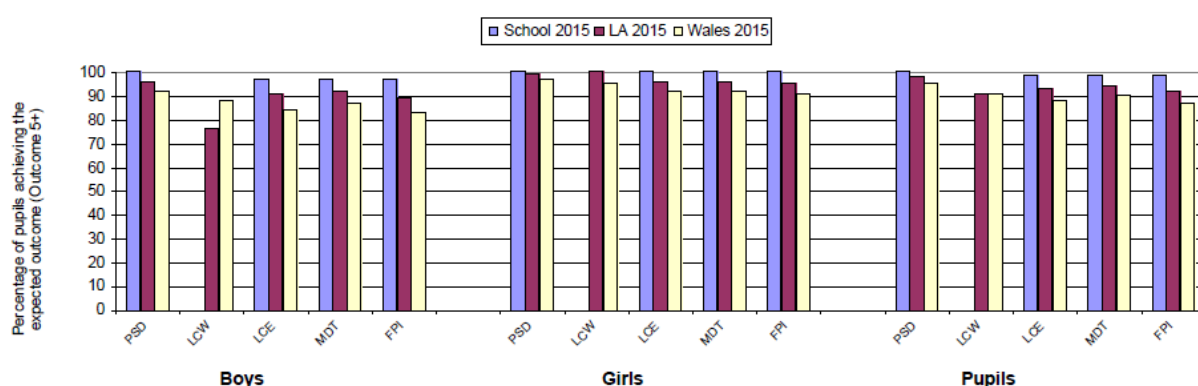
Arrangements for Next Election of Parent Governors

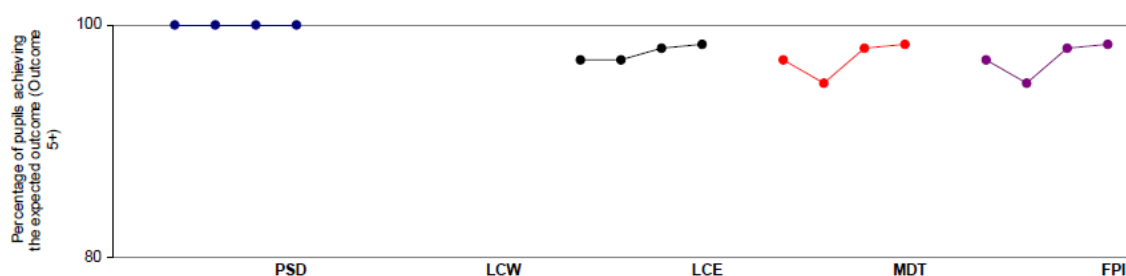

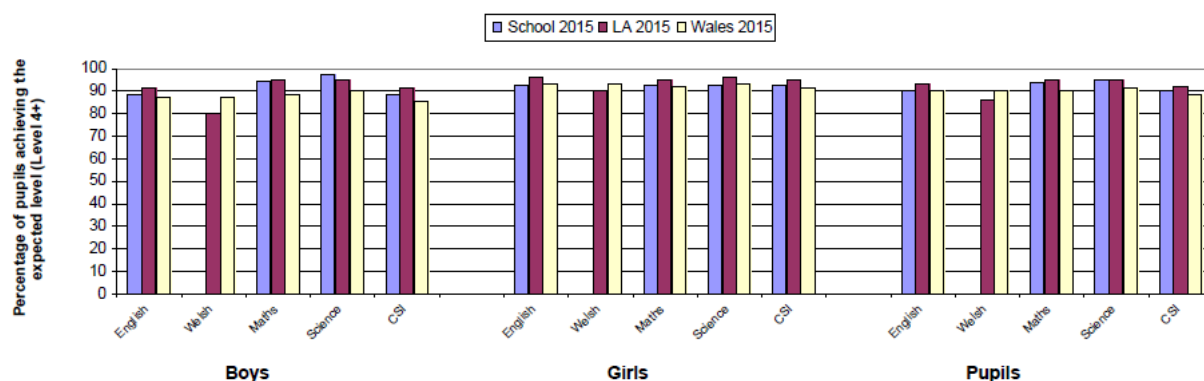

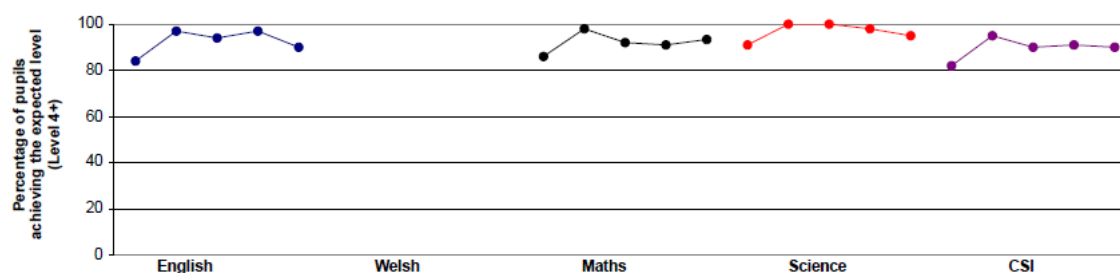

School Improvement Targets

These priorities were formulated in July 2014. We aimed to make significant progress on each of these priorities by the end of the academic year.

1. Raise standards in maths through consolidating strategies for teaching across the school
2. Further develop Assessment for Learning strategies consistently across the school
3. Address the emerging trend of boys out-performing girls at the end of Key Stage 2
4. Improve lunchtime provision and relationship management for pupils
5. Develop consistency of home learning across the school.

School Attendance Targets

Our actual school attendance in 2014/15 was 96.8%, which was above our target of 96.2% and this put our attendance in the top 25% of schools across Wales. During the year, there was 2.6% authorised absence and 0.6% unauthorised absence. Both these figures have improved since 2013/14. With 95.7% attendance in 2014/15, Monmouthshire County Council had the highest primary school attendance in Wales.

Our school target for 2015-16 is to maintain this 96.8% level of attendance. There were no permanent or fixed term exclusions in 2014/15.

Actions to Promote Healthy Eating and Drinking

During the year, the Eco Team worked on a range of activities to develop healthy eating and lifestyles and this led to the awarding of the school's second Green Flag in January 2015. The Parent and Teachers' Association sold water bottles for children to use in class. The school upgraded drinking water dispensers in the infant and junior corridors as well the staffroom. Pupils in Foundation Phase learned about healthy eating as part of their curriculum work.

The later part of the year saw a great deal of work on developing the school's Health and Fitness Policy which was based on a model policy from Monmouthshire County Council and which linked to the national Appetite for Life agenda. This work saw the formation of a Healthy School Team led by Mrs Peckham and a number of key changes to healthy food in school. For example, from September 2015 only fruit or vegetable snacks can be consumed by pupils at morning break while policy was developed around celebrating birthdays and ending cake and sweets from home to 'celebrate' holidays. Much of this work was supported by the local authority's Health School officer.

In 2014/15, the school spent 79.2% of its total funding on staffing (£1,096,963). The main, non-operational, costs for 2014/15 went on maths resources to support our new whole school strategy, reading resources and corridor flooring.

During 2014/15 the school received a gift of £89.57 from the Coventry Building Society as part of their 'Save for Schools' scheme. We received £300 as a prize from Tesco after a pupil won a competition and £100 from grandparents who attended one of our Grandparents Open Afternoons. The school also received a donation of £2 from a parent. The school has a policy of not paying expenses to school governors.

Sports and Extracurricular Activities

Each week, all classes receive one lesson of physical education through Prostars, a professional sports coaching organisation, who cover teachers' statutory non-contact time allocation. Class teachers provide a second PE session, which might (at some time in the year) be a swimming lesson. In 2014/15 we offered an average of 17 extra-curricular clubs (plus daily Breakfast Club and After School Club).

In the 2015 School Sport Survey, many pupils (63%) thinking PE lessons and school sport help them have healthy lifestyles compared to 46% across Monmouthshire and 51% across Wales.

Three pupils undertook training and were appointed as Sports Ambassadors working with younger children and promoting sports and fitness. They also coordinated the collection of Sainsbury's Active Kids vouchers.

Our footballers took on Blakeney Primary School and won convincingly while players from Years 4-6 returned with silverware from the Chepstow Cluster Primary tournament. In the Monmouthshire Country Football Tournament our Year 5 and 6 team came second overall. Year 6 pupils took on a staff team in a 5-a-side match watched by the rest of the school.

Year 6 players took part in hockey tournaments in Cwmbran and Caldicot. Two pupils from Year 3 took part in the Welsh Schools' Tumble & Vault gymnastic competition. A pupil in Year 4 took the Monmouthshire Cross Country Year 3/4 Boys' title while another in Year 6 took the Year 5/6 Boys' title in a competition that saw runners from across our Key Stage 2 classes. One pupil in Year 6 was selected to play cricket for Gwent and Wales' U 12 team while another represented Gwent in the U10 team. A boy in Year 5 won the 2015 Welsh Tennis Championships in the 10 and under age group for the fourth consecutive year. Our Key Stage 2 team took first place in the cluster Police Sports Day, held this year at St. Mary's Primary School. Our Year 5 & 6 team came second in the cluster swimming gala.

50 players from our chess club travelled to Monmouth School for a match to celebrate The Grange's 50th anniversary. Players won a string of individual and team titles, prizes and trophies during the year. In particular a pupil in Year 4 became the under 9 Girls' British Champion.

Community Links

The governing body are keen to develop links with the local community and to give pupils a sense of belonging as active citizens in their local, national and global community.

Donations

Chepstow Lions donated £100 towards the £227 that we raised to pay for a pupil's coaching fees as part of her representing Wales in the World Youth Chess Championships in South Africa. A pupil in Year 1 won Chepstow Fire Station's Bonfire poster competition and a Year 4 pupil won a major Tesco competition with his design being printed on their Bags for Life and the school receiving a prize of £300. The Welsh Chess Union funded our under 9 and under 11 teams in the ESPCA semi-finals.

Visits

Reception visited Tintern Old Station. Year 1 visited the National Museum in Cardiff. Year 2 visited Miles Morgan travel agents to learn about holidays, SARA's Beachley headquarters and Weston Super Mere. Our Year 2 singers sang at a Castle Court Nursing Home and Severnview Residential Home in the weeks before Christmas. They also sang at the official opening of Chepstow Garden Centre's Christmas celebrations and in spring they and Year 1 visited Chepstow Baptist Church to learn about the Easter story. Our Musical Theatre Club sang at Chepstow Choral Society's concert at St. Mary's Priory Church. Year 4 visited Raglan Castle and Chepstow Library. Year 5 visited Chepstow Library and St. Fagan's Museum. Our Year 6 'Family of Schools' Ambassadors visited Usk Primary School and Magor CiW Primary School. Some of our Year 6 pupils took part in a cluster 'Dragons' Den' event where they designed an app based on things to do in Chepstow.

Visitors

We welcomed Rev Chris Blanchard from St. Mary's Priory Church for half termly assemblies. We also welcomed preschoolers to a number of our Christmas concerts.

Our links with Chepstow Bookshop grew even stronger as we hosted three author visits to the school, which gave children the opportunity to hear from and talk to real authors and got them interested in the possibility of writing for a living! PC Finnister worked with all classes on themes in the Gwent Police Core Programme. Chepstow Male Voice Choir performed for pupils as part of our St. David's Day celebrations. We welcomed Mr Assan, headteacher of Yankho, our partner school in Lilongwe, Malawi. Former Wales rugby star Ian Gough visited to talk to the children about his career and positive philosophy. Colleagues from Gwent Wildlife visited to support the PTA in developing the Conservation Area and we welcomed Councillor Liz Hackett-Pain, Monmouthshire County Council's elected member for Education and Young People. Colleagues from NSPCC visited to work with our School Council while Chepstow Rotary visited to present dictionaries to 'Most Improved Pupils' selected by staff from Years R to 5. Chepstow Mayor Cllr Rook presented prizes to two pupils who won the Chepstow Town Council Art Competition.

We also welcomed a brass quintet from Gwent Music who performed for the children and let them try out a range of instruments.

Parents & Grandparents

We held three 'Grandparents Open Afternoons' to show grandparents how their loved ones spend their day and learn and we held five learning walks for parents focussing on literacy, numeracy and Foundation Phase. We introduced 'Meet The Teacher' sessions at the start of the year to develop closer links between home and school and we held two Parent Forum meetings as well as introducing a Sharing Day; an opportunity for parents to drop in and share their child's learning in the hall.

Parent and Teacher Association

In 2014, Friends of The Dell transformed into the PTA and launched the school lottery. The PTA held a very popular Quiz and Chips night as well as three discos for pupils. This year the PTA have project managed the installation & fundraising for a new seating area in the Conservation Area as well as a number of other management & development aspects in this great resource. This included a 'Dig for The Dell' morning one weekend where a number of parents came to maintain the site.

Both PTA and governors worked with colleagues in new cluster PTA and governor meetings.

Colleagues

We welcomed colleagues from Coed Eva Primary School who came to see how we use ICT for learning. Staff worked with colleagues at Evenlode Primary School in Penarth on agreeing standards of pupils' work and moderating pupils' learning. Mr King, Mrs Haynes and Mr Nicholas worked with senior leaders from Chepstow Primary schools on 'peer reviews' of Chepstow School and Shirenewton Primary and Mrs Peckham visited St. Gladys Primary in Bargoed to learn about their Healthy School work. A number of staff visited various schools in our Chepstow Cluster for meetings, training and moderation of learning activities.

Charity

Pupils raised £235.36 for the Royal British Legion through poppy sales, raised £355.90 for Chepstow Food Bank through our Harvest Sale and raised £457.60 for Children in Need. We raised £459.16 for Red Nose Day while Malawi Day raised £373 for Yankho Elementary School in Malawi and the School Council raised a further £152.35 to pay the school fees of Ruth & Aisha (and some extra money for general Yankho School funds). Staff raised £80.77 for Breast Cancer Relief through a 'Wear it Pink' day. Pupils also donated 246 shoeboxes for Chepstow Rotary Club's Christmas appeal.

Other Community Support

Year 2 undertook Kerbcraft road safety sessions through Monmouthshire CC. We retained the Ruth Sweeting Cup for the most number of entries to the Chepstow Show and won a number of other awards. Year 2 won the PTA's Matchbox Challenge and pocketed £25 to spend (on whatever they wanted!) We launched a new online school uniform shop for parents with Tesco giving parents a choice of where to purchase from. Our Eco Team donated a number of shoes and boots to Tintern Old Station as part of their recycling and planting bulbs work. Jarrold Tyres in Monmouth helped us develop 'Tyreworld' for infants & juniors. Chepstow Councillor Ned Heywood donated family tickets for the 2015 Chepstow Festival and our Foundation Phase 'Wishing Line' asked parents for specific help and items to support learning and proved very effective.

The School's Curriculum and Organisation of Teaching

The school follows the national (Wales) programme of study for pupils aged 3-19 years. It is made up of the following seven areas:

- The Foundation Phase
- Skills development
- The national curriculum (Key Stage 2)
- Personal and social education
- Sex education
- Careers and the world of work
- Religious education.

The school curriculum is learner focussed, places an emphasis on skills development and ensures that it is appropriate for the specific needs of Wales.

Children join The Dell when they are four, going on five, and for their first three years are taught the

Foundation Phase Framework curriculum. This consists of seven areas of learning:

- Personal and Social Development, Well-being and Cultural Diversity
- Language, Literacy and Communication Skills
- Mathematical Development
- Welsh Language Development
- Knowledge and Understanding of the World
- Physical Development
- Creative Development.

At the end of Year 2, all pupils are assessed on the three core areas of Language and Communication, Mathematical Development and Personal and Social Development. Nationally pupils are expected to achieve Foundation Phase Outcome 5 at the end of Year 2. More able pupils should achieve Foundation Phase Outcome 6. In Foundation Phase, on any given day, children experience a carefully planned mix of indoor and outdoor learning. These activities will also have a mixture of teacher or teaching assistant led learning as well as independent group learning. All pupils in Reception had whole class lessons each week where they were taught to play the violin or cello by teachers from Gwent Music.

At age seven, going on eight, pupils move on to Year 3. Learning in years 3 - 6 (Key Stage 2) is planned using the National Curriculum, which was last updated in 2008. This curriculum has a clear focus on teaching of skills and covers maths, English, science, Welsh as a second language, history, geography, physical education, art and design, music and technology. Alongside this statutory curriculum, teachers use the non-statutory Skills Framework to build in progressive skills across each area. In 2013, the Welsh Government issued the Literacy and Numeracy Framework which aims to ensure that all pupils have a strong understanding of literacy and numeracy skills across the curriculum and are able to apply them to real life situations. In every lesson, children are exposed to literacy, numeracy, Welsh and information technology skills.

At the end of Year 6, all pupils are assessed on the four core areas of English, maths, science and Welsh. Nationally pupils are expected to achieve NC Level 4 at the end of Year 6. More able pupils should achieve NC Level 5 or occasionally higher.

During 2014/15, approximately 6% of pupils were registered as having an additional educational need. Around 62% of these pupils' needs were met by their class teacher and/or teaching assistant ('School Action'), 27% of these pupils received additional support from outside the school ('School Action +') and 12% of these pupils were in receipt of a statement of additional need. In all cases, apart from occasional withdrawal, all pupils with additional educational needs were taught alongside other pupils in the classroom. We worked with colleagues at Monmouthshire County Council and another school to support one pupil for part of the year.

Planning for, Monitoring and Ensuring Progress

'In autumn term 2013, the school introduced a process for setting challenging targets for pupils to achieve as well as a system for monitoring progress from Reception to Year 6 (see below).

Setting Milestones

- In Foundation Phase we look at each child's Baseline Assessment data at half term in their summer term and use it, alongside assessments and professional judgement, to set a MINIMUM end of FP outcome in LLC and MD. We then use the FP Progress Predictor to produce MINIMUM progress milestones for the end of each term in Years 1 and 2.
- At the start of Year 1 teachers set a MINIMUM end of FP outcome for PSD. We do not track this aspect though this target can be amended at any time.

- In Key Stage 2 we take each pupil's End of FP outcomes for LLC and MD and we use the KS2 Progress Predictor to produce MINIMUM end of KS2 levels for English and Maths. We then use the Predictor to set end of term and end of Year milestones for the four years in KS2.
- Because there is no assessment data for Welsh Second Language, teachers in Year 3 will produce MINIMUM end of KS2 levels by half term (or target setting deadline) and set end of term and year milestones using the Progress Predictor.

Reviewing Milestones

- At the end of each term all teachers will review their pupils' milestones. They will tick the milestone if it has been achieved or exceeded. They will mark with 'E' if they have been exceeded.
- At the end of Year 4/start of Year 5, teachers will work together to review each child's milestones and 'up level' as appropriate. At this point teachers identify pupils who might achieve level 6 (targeting Level 6 prior to this would not have been an option based on end of FP data alone).
- Teachers repeat this process at the end of Year 5/start of Year 6.
- At the end of Year 3, having had a year of working in Key Stage 2, teachers will review targets and may, in a very few cases, lower milestones. This will be the case for pupils who just managed to attain a FPO6 but who would not easily manage to attain a Level 5 at the end of KS2. (This is due to disparity between FPO6 and NC Level 3)

The Language of the School

English is the everyday working language of the school. All pupils are taught through the medium of English.

Use of Welsh Language

Welsh language skills are taught in every class. Initially, much of the teaching takes place through incidental language during the course of the school day. Staff encourage pupils to use Welsh for everyday routine questions and requests as well as to hold simple conversations with other pupils and adults. Opportunities are given to develop pupils' oracy, reading and writing skills. We aim to create a Welsh ethos through introducing to children the history, art, music and geography of Wales. Every Monday pupils attend the headteacher's 'Monday Welsh Quiz' which focusses on a different aspect of Wales and Welshness (eg: towns, cities, mountains, national parks, wildlife, music, food etc). No pupils are exempt from Welsh language learning as this is part of the statutory National Curriculum in Wales.
